

# SUPERINTENDENT MESSAGE

School District of New Berlin Friends, Families and Supporters - Thank You for Reading the 2022-23 Annual Report!

In this year's report - our annual "highlight package" - you'll see a recap of many of the great things that happened throughout the year in our great district. You'll see evidence of our efforts to provide the best possible learning environments that we can for all students. But what you won't necessarily see is the heavy lifting we did related to the state's major literacy issue.



Before the state Senate and Assembly passed a comprehensive reading bill that

Gov. Tony Evers signed into law this summer - a bill designed to improve reading proficiency for students across Wisconsin - the School District of New Berlin was at the forefront of the change.

After years of research, data-diving and comparisons, we made the important decision to implement a new English Language Arts - or reading - curriculum. Throughout the 2022-23 school year, staff and administrators worked diligently to implement the curriculum, which is centered on the "Science of Reading."

In January, we presented at the State Education Convention on our work, and in partnership with Wisconsin Reads, we presented a showing of the powerful documentary "The Truth About Reading" at the West Performing Arts Center. In the spring, we welcomed State Senators John Jagler and Rob Hutton and State Representative Dave Maxey to Elmwood Elementary for a "Science of Reading Snapshot", to demonstrate how we used to teach reading instruction and contrasted it with how we are doing it now. And as state lawmakers and legislators debated the merits of the science of reading and the funding needed to implement it statewide, I testified in front of the Senate Committee on Education, urging them to support the bill and invest in our students' futures.

We have quickly become an example of what could be achieved across the state. And we are proud to be leaders in this effort and advocates for change that we believe will benefit the students of New Berlin - and Wisconsin - for decades to come.

I hope you enjoy our Annual Report and continue to support us as we turn our attention to the 2023-24 school year!

# **APRIL 2023 ELECTION**

Incumbent **Amy Crosby** and newcomer **Allison Spindler** were sworn into office by Wisconsin Supreme Court Justice Rebecca Bradley in April. The pair were the only two candidates to run for the School Board in the 2023 spring election. Ms. Spindler replaced **Krislyn Holaday-Wondracheck**, who served for six years on the School Board through April, and chose not to run for re-election.

# STATE REPORT CARDS

The SDNB was one of just I8 out of 377 districts in Wisconsin to "significantly exceed" expectations on the state-issued report cards last fall. The district was also one of just I3 K-I2 districts to achieve that mark. All SDNB schools continue to

"significantly exceed" or "exceed" expectations according to the state's school report cards, with Elmwood, Orchard Lane, Poplar Creek and Eisenhower "significantly exceeding expectations". Scores for five of the six schools increased from the previous year, as did the district's overall score, from 84.2 to 85.2.

#### HOME BUILDERS

For the fifth consecutive year, SDNB students kicked off the school year by working with Tim O'Brien Homes to build a home. The students are in the district's Construction III class and typically spend half the school day for the entire semester onsite working on the house. They learn from professionals everything about house building, from foundation concepts, framing, plumbing, electrical, roofing, finishing and more. The class built a home in a Lisbon subdivision.

## FLEXING FLUID POWER


The Eisenhower middle school Fluid Power Challenge teams earned two of five trophies in a 40-plus-team competition. Eisenhower-Purple took home the Teamwork Champion trophy and Eisenhower-Gold won the Design Champion trophy. The STEM-based competition, sponsored by the National Fluid Power Association and Price Engineering, challenges students to solve an engineering problem using fluid power and requires them to work in teams to design and build their mechanisms





#### MORE STEM SUCCESS

Eisenhower Rube Goldberg teams enjoyed success in STEM Forward's Engineering Machine Design Contest. Eisenhower Gold won special awards for Panther Persistence and Best Presentation, while Eisenhower Purple claimed the Best Design special award and third place overall. Both teams advanced to the championship April 2I in Minnesota, where Eisenhower Purple finished second and Gold placed fifth.



# SOLID FIRST SEASON FOR ESPORTS

The Eisenhower esports team, a club new to the district last year, won its first-ever playoff match during the fall season. Sponsored by CoreBTS and Technology Plus, the exciting new program - organized, competitive video gaming - is expanding to West this fall.

### ROBOT CHALLENGE

Aren Schik, Jack Klein and Dima Olekhnovich earned a gold medal in the SkillsUSA Wisconsin Industrial Robotics competition. The team was challenged to plan, program and execute an automated solution to a real-world, material-handling challenge using a six-axis industrial robot workcell.



# BEYOND 18 PROGRAMS PROVIDE EXPERIENCES

The district's Beyond I8 programs - Pathways and Young Adult Services - participated in a wide range of handson learning experiences. In addition to operating a food service program called the Crockery Company, they worked at several community businesses, including Above Par Golf Cars and the Ronald McDonald House, learned health and gardening at Zachariah's Acres and met with social groups out in the community.

# FRENCH EXCELLENCE ...

More than 30 West students competed at the regional French pronunciation contest and 28 qualified for the state competition, the most in school history. The students spent enormous amounts of time learning, practicing, memorizing, incorporating judges' feedback, and perfecting a poem for the contests.



### **ALL-OUT BLITZ**

The Blitz Robotics team visited Poplar Creek to share about robotics careers, showcase their robot, and teach students about circuits while they built doodle mini robots. The team designs and builds a robot for competition, hosted by FIRST, a global robotic community. The club helps cultivate a passion for STEM through a mentor-based program which builds science, engineering and technology skills. Life skills such as communication, problem-solving and leadership are also emphasized.



# ... AND SPANISH, TOO!

Twenty-three West Spanish students attained national recognition for excellent performance on the 2023 National Spanish Exams. The exams measure performance and achievement. Three students - **Sebastian Correa**, **Luis Prado** and **Carlos Rodriguez** - earned gold medals, six earned silver, three earned bronze and II were honorable mentions.



# WEST ACDEC REPEATS AS STATE CHAMPS; ALSO NATIONAL RUNNERS-UP

West followed up a 2022 Division 2 academic decathlon state title performance with the Division 3 championship in 2023. Vivian Dinh, West's top scholar, was second overall in the Honors division and earned first place with a perfect score in super quiz. Sebastian Correa and Angel Chao were first with perfect scores in interview; Austin Bentrup-Trumbull had a perfect score in super quiz and Marcus Hernandez was first in economics. Eisenhower placed second behind West, led by Isha Joshi, Al Gurda and Morgan Gagnon.

West also qualified for Online Nationals in April for the first time in school history, where the Vikings were second among the medium-sized schools. Chao was the second-highest top-scoring student overall, including the top score in literature. Other Vikings top performers in their division were Hernandez (economics) and **Wyatt Doyle** (social science).



# LITERACY NIGHT EXCITES

Elmwood's first-ever literacy night was a big hit. Students cozied up in the school's reading nook, visited the New Berlin Public Library stations and completed makerspace activities, while families learned more about the district's new English Language Arts curriculum and programming.

# **IMPACT GRANTS**

Thanks to the generosity of numerous donors, the Education Foundation of New Berlin awarded more than \$16,000 in Impact Grants to programs that benefit students across all six schools.

- PROJECT LEAD THE WAY (awarded to Caroline Haebig & Jennifer Schlie-Reed) to provide opportunities for all kindergarten through fifth grade students to participate in consistent, strategic learning experiences that develop skills related to computational thinking, foundations of programming, computer science and systems by utilizing "Project Lead the Way" computer science launch modules during students' regularly scheduled library time.
- CALMING CORNERS (awarded to Jennifer Coyle & Todd Hrenak) to support all Orchard Lane students by employing a space in each classroom, chosen by the teacher, where students can go to help regulate their physical and emotional state and learn strategies for emotional regulation.
- BATTLE OF THE BOOKS (awarded to Katie Berg & Emily Barber) to support the Ronald Reagan third and fourth grade Battle of the Books club, which promotes reading comprehension, while creating a fun atmosphere for learning. The tremendously popular club will be able to increase the number of books available.

- CONSTRUCTION TOOLS (awarded to Taylor Molitor & Ben Bauer) to purchase miter saws, plumbing crimping and expansion tools, and metal electrical boxes. These tools provide students with the necessary equipment to complete a much wider range of construction projects in the fields of carpentry, plumbing and electrical work.

  SYSTEM (awarded to Dana McLaren & Devin
  McKinnon) to support middle and high school
  students by enhancing partnership tours
  and field experiences which are used to show
  and teach students about manufacturing,

  system will be utilized to ensure all students can
  hear what is said and participate more fully.
- ELEMENTARY PHOTOGRAPHY (awarded to Leah Schretenthaler, Terry Berg, Amy Weber & Kyra Seely) to broaden and strengthen current art curriculum with the addition of a sixth grade photography unit. The grant helped purchase four Pinsta-Pro camera kits to show students the magic of analog photography. The kits will rotate through the elementary schools for a month-long unit.

won the state tournament.




# YOU GOTTA HAVE FAITH

Faith Wehrman became the first runner in New Berlin schools history to win the WIAA cross country state meet. The Eisenhower sophomore finished the Division 2 run in 18 minutes, 14.8 seconds, 10 seconds better than the runner-up to cap an historic season. The victory came one year after Wehrman took second at state as a freshman.


# WEST CHEER CLAIMS STATE TITLE

The West senior successfully defended her state shot put crown with a Division 2 state-record throw of 49 feet 2.5 inches at the track and field state championships in June. She also finished second in the discus – with another school record – helping West finish fifth in the team standings.

Schultz, a UW-Green Bay basketball recruit, finished her hoops career at West as the school's all-time leader in points (I,666) and rebounds (86I).



# EISENHOWER DANCE MAKES IT FOUR STRAIGHT

The Eisenhower dance team continued its dominance by winning its fourth consecutive dual state championship, winning the Division 2 jazz and Division 4 pom competitions at the Wisconsin Association of Cheer/Pom Coaches state meet in February. The team was led by seniors **Kyla Koski**, **Camryn Rajala** and **Ella Wendlick**.

# TENNIS TEAM TAKES FOURTH

At the WIAA Division 2 State Tennis Tournament, Eisenhower's **Alex Schmidt** and **Luke Yoon** pulled off a couple of upsets and long, thrilling victories to go 3-2 and earn fourth place. The remarkable effort capped a season in which Schmidt, Yoon and their Lions teammates won the conference dual and tournament championships and were subsectional co-champions.

# STATE APPEARANCES FOR IKE GIRLS SOCCER, SOFTBALL

The Lions soccer team, playing in its third consecutive state tournament and eighth overall, fell to eventual state champion Plymouth in the Division 3 semifinals to close out its campaign. And in softball, the Lions made their first state appearance in nine years – after winning their first conference crown in eight seasons – but fell short with a loss to New London in the Division 2 semifinals.



# VIKINGS FOOTBALL RAISES BAR

Playing in the state semifinals for the first time in nearly three and a half decades, the West (IO-3) football team fell one win shy of reaching Camp Randall Stadium. The Vikings rattled off three thrilling playoff victories before the season finale and advanced further in the playoffs than any other West team since I988.

# MORE WEST TRACK SUCCESS

Along with Schultz's championship effort, two relays also played a big role in the Vikings' fifth-place state finish. The 800-meter relay of **Ashley Babcock**, **Natalie Leupi**, **Rachel Leupi** and **Aubrey Lane** ran third while the I,600 relay of **Caroline Gerovac**, Babcock, Rachel Leupi and Lane ran fourth, both setting school records.

# OTHER HIGHLIGHTS

- Eisenhower's **Lexi Bugajski** became the first girls volleyball player in school history to record I,000 career kills.
- Eisenhower had two, top-five state swimming performances; Ryann
   Nutt swam fourth in the IOO-yard butterfly and joined Grace Fan, Sarah
   Schroeder and Meredith Giese for fifth in the 200 freestyle relay.
- The Eisenhower girls track team won its first conference title since 1995; the Lions also won the sectional.
- The Eisenhower baseball team made it to the sectional for the first time since 2014.

# **WEST AWARDS**

Social studies teacher **Beth Vento** was selected as a Claes Nobel Educator of Distinction by The National Honor Society of High School Scholars, an honor that recognizes exemplary educators whose passion and devotion inspire students to grow and develop as scholars, leaders and citizens. And Nicole Thompson, a Spanish teacher, was named a Cooperative Academic Partnership Program - or CAAP - Adjunct of the Year. CAPP teachers are appointed as adjunct instructors at UW-Oshkosh and work cooperatively with professors to implement college courses.





## TEACHER OF THE YEAR

**Saghar Homayounpour**, a computer science teacher at West, was one of five distinguished educators to be named a 2024 Wisconsin Teacher of the Year by the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction.

The selected group received the award for their tireless dedication toward students and the profession. Homayounpour is starting her ninth year as a computer science teacher at West after spending one year as a student learning assistant at Poplar Creek. She has grown West's computer science program to serve more than 200 students annually, exposing students and developing their skills in this continually evolving field. She also founded the school's successful CyberPatriot Club and is a mentor teacher who supports novice computer science teachers with one-on-one support as they begin their teaching experience.

The 2024 Wisconsin Teachers of the Year are among the IOO educators recognized earlier this year by the Herb Kohl Educational Foundation's Teacher Fellowship Program, which honors and supports teaching excellence and innovation across Wisconsin. The honorees were selected by a diverse committee to represent voices, contexts, and perspectives as educational leaders throughout Wisconsin.





## SIX EDUCATORS EARN HERB KOHL RECOGNITION

A district-record six educators were chosen as Herb Kohl Educational Foundation Fellowship Award winners. Samantha Braun, a special ed teacher at West; Saghar Homayounpour, a computer science teacher at West; Karin Houston, a counselor at West; Samantha Jayne, an English teacher and English Learner instructional coach at West; Devin McKinnon, a technology education teacher at Eisenhower; and Alison Napieralski, a special ed teacher at Elmwood (not pictured). It is the sixth straight year the SDNB has had at least four Kohl award recipients. They were among the IOO Wisconsin educators to earn this year's \$6,000 award with a matching \$6,000 award given to their respective schools.



# PHY ED TEACHER OF THE YEAR

Elmwood's **Melanie Gearhart** was named the 2022 Wisconsin Elementary Physical Educator of the Year. Ms. Gearhart, a Herb Kohl award winner in 2021, received her award from the Wisconsin Health and Physical Education Association thanks in part to her innovative approaches to classroom instruction.

# BUDGET DETAILS / STRATEGIC FINANCE

# FISCAL RESPONSIBILITY

The School District of New Berlin's administration and Board of Education has historically focused on providing the best-possible educational experiences and environments to all students while remaining cognizant of the needs of all taxpayers. Through fiscal responsibility focused on a transparent annual budget cycle and maximizing strategic finance tools, the administration and School Board jointly focus on both the district's immediate and long-term financial health.



# TAX LEVY CONTINUES TO DECREASE

As New Berlin's equalized property value continues to rise, along with the SDNB's management of the 2022-23 budget that resulted in a 40 percent increase in state aid, the tax levy continues to fall. After the tax rate dipped to \$6.89 per \$1,000 of equalized value last fiscal year, the SDNB estimates that it will drop to \$6.14 per \$1,000 this year. The result, for the owner of a \$250,000 home, is an estimated gross decrease of \$187.50 on the school tax portion of their property bill. This will mark the ninth consecutive year the tax rate decreased.

# 2023-24 PRELIMINARY BUDGET KEY POINTS

The preliminary budget, approved in June, sets fiscal priorities for the upcoming school year and allows the district to operate until the original budget is adopted in October.

The SDNB anticipates several changes from the preliminary budget to the original budget, as a result of the state of Wisconsin's budget. General fund revenue and expenditure assumptions, however, in the 2023-24 preliminary budget include:

- a \$325 increase in per pupil revenue limit;
- a reduction in federal funding due to a reduction of ESSER funding;
- a 3.15 percent increase for certified staff wages;
- 0 percent increase in health-related expenses.

# WAWM DETACHMENT

For decades, New Berlin residents living in a narrow strip along the city's eastern border, from Greenfield Avenue to Howard Avenue, were considered part of either the Elmbrook School District or the West Allis-West Milwaukee School District.

Last spring, the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction approved a detachment petition that transfers approximately I60 residences from the WAWM school district into the School District of New Berlin. The detachment could result in as many as 20 new students attending the SDNB for the 2023–24 school year. Elementary students will attend Orchard Lane, and secondary students will attend Eisenhower.

The SDNB is working with the new families to make the transition as smooth as possible, and we will share more information related to the detachment's effect on the budget and more in future publications.

# **GROWTH OF FUND 41**

In 2022, the School Board approved the establishment of Fund 4I, which supports the capital maintenance of facilities. The dollars levied into this fund can only be used for capital facility improvements, cannot be transferred to other funds and enhances - rather than replaces - the regular maintenance budget.

#### Projects that have been completed since establishing Fund 4I include:

- Eisenhower: roof repairs and fiber optic expansion
- West: sidewalk repairs and fiber optic expansion
- Elmwood: rear drive reconstruction, stormwater redirection, sidewalk repairs, and LED upgrades
- Orchard Lane: playground/parking lot improvements and LED upgrades
- Poplar Creek: parking lot, playground and LED upgrades
- Ronald Reagan: LED upgrades

These are projects being done in addition to regular maintenance that is funded in our general budget. Upcoming projects include window replacements at Elmwood, generator upgrades, and clock/bell/notification systems at each school.

It is important to note that project priority is subject to cost, availability of materials and labor and many other factors. The long-range maintenance plan, therefore, is a "living document" that changes regularly as needed.

# NAMING RIGHTS SPONSORSHIPS

The SDNB welcomed two great additions to its naming rights sponsorship program participants last school year.

**C&M Fencing** signed a 5-year, \$25,000 agreement that recognizes the locally owned company as an official sponsor of Eisenhower athletics and gives it naming rights to the school's soccer field, now known as C&M Fencing Soccer Field.

At West, **Horicon Bank** inked a 5-year, \$8,000 agreement that designates the bank as an official sponsor of West athletics and gives the bank naming rights to West's outdoor ticket booth, now known as the Horicon Bank Vikings Ticket Booth.

In two years since initiating the naming rights program, the SDNB has secured approximately \$300,000 in financial commitments through six sponsorships. Previously agreed to partnerships were with **Drexel Building Supply** (West's fieldhouse), **Aspen Orthopedic Specialists** and **Orthopaedic Hospital of Wisconsin** (West's outdoor baseball and soccer complex); **Optimum Crush** (West's softball field) and **Waukesha State Bank** (Eisenhower's indoor concession stand).

The SDNB has a multitude of naming rights sponsorship opportunities available to interested partners. The district's sponsorship guide showcases those opportunities in three categories: academics, the arts and athletics. Venues still available for naming rights opportunities include the Performing Arts Center, indoor and outdoor athletic complexes and facilities, and many more, all the way down to individual classrooms and hallways.
