One Size Does Not Fit All

How the SDNB strives to help students with unique career paths

Last year, Eisenhower's Manzoor Mohis, then a junior, needed to create - and regularly consult - a Google sheet just to help keep track of his daily schedule. He had a college class, an internship and classes at lke, including an English class that he would attend at different times depending on the day.

"Sometimes I'd be in discussions with one group of people and the next day I'd be discussing the topic with an entirely new set of people," he said. "That was weird, but it worked."

Makayla Arndt, Manzoor's classmate, spends only sixth hour at Eisenhower. The rest of her day is spent taking college courses through the Start College Now Program at Waukesha County Technical College and at the I8-week internship with the Milwaukee Police Department she started this semester.

West junior Kristian Price also attends WCTC; he is a fully enrolled student in the mechanical engineering design program. Tyree Sawyer, another West junior, is an amateur boxer and Wisconsin Golden Gloves champion. His schedule is entirely virtual to allow him to train for the sport he loves.

Similarly, 2023 Eisenhower graduate Natasja Radulovic, who in February represented the United States at the 2024 World Junior Cup Speedskating Championships in Hachinohe, Japan, was regularly out of the classroom as a result of her intensive speedskating training regimen and competition travel.

Each of the students have very unique paths toward success beyond high school, but what do they all have in common?

They are all prime examples of the School District of New Berlin's willingness to meet the specific college, career and life ready needs of all students.

FOCUS ON COLLEGE, CAREER & LIFE

College and career - and life! - readiness, or CCR, has been the SDNB's rallying cry for years. The district is committed to providing a solid foundation for all students to be successful in their chosen path after graduation. The vision of an SDNB graduate identifies the knowledge, skills and dispositions students should have in order to be ready to effectively navigate future opportunities. This charge is not only a staple of the district's strategic plan, but it is woven into day-to-day plans and preparations across all grade levels at all SDNB schools.

The foundation for CCR readiness begins in the elementary schools. Beyond providing students with the basic skills needed for success in reading, math and other core subjects, 2023 Eisenhower graduate Natasja Radulovic

students also learn about future potential careers through Jump Into Your Future Days and the fifth-grade BizTown experience. Including student dispositions as part of their report cards ensures that by the time those students are in sixth grade, they are well-rounded and prepared for middle school.

In middle school, students actively participate in the academic and career planning process, choosing classes that align to their interests. And special career days expose students to a variety of professions that will one day be available to them.

By the time they enter high school, students may be in a position to pursue a career they are passionate about. That means that each and every year hundreds of students with unique interests and skills are setting their course on a myriad of different paths.

"We have a shared responsibility to help students explore a wide variety of learning opportunities that support their personal, academic, social and career goals," Superintendent Joe Garza said.

"But supporting students in finding out what it is they want to do and the educational experiences it takes to achieve those goals is not a one-size-fits-all operation."

Manzoor is a prime example.
He's now a year into his internship, jointly sponsored by Marquette
University and the Medical College of Wisconsin. He attends multiple 3-hour

workshops per week where he has an opportunity to further his research understanding through exposure to state-of-the-art technology, scientific scholarly writing and laboratory techniques and methodologies.

His focus is lung research and genetic defects that cause chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, or COPD. His schedule is slightly less convoluted this year as it was last year, when he had a college course in the mix as well.

"It was a dream schedule," Mohis said. "I got to do everything I wanted to do. I got to take a college class, I got to do an internship, I had classes at Eisenhower and I was even in two sports. It was great."

COUNTLESS OPPORTUNITIES

The SDNB has been a trailblazer when it comes to the number of opportunities it provides students outside of its own walls. College in High School partnerships with the UW System of Colleges and participation in WCTC's Dual Enrollment Program are just two ways students can get ahead. There is also the Youth Apprenticeship program, that provides students with occupational and hands-on work

experience while taking concurrent coursework that connects to a variety of career paths such as manufacturing, information technology and more.

Some students participate in co-ops, or supervised work placements, where students average IO-I5 hours of paid employment per week and concentrate on the development and practice of positive work traits. Mix in mentorships, service-learning opportunities, internships - and in the cases of Tyree and Nastasja, unique athletic aspirations - and quite a bit of schedule juggling is required.

"The entire Eisenhower community has been beyond supportive of me in giving me the opportunity to pursue my athletic career," said Nastasja, while at the airport before boarding a plane for Japan. "I think one of the most influential resources the school provided me was flexibility in my academic schedule so that I could have more time dedicated to my sport."

Kristian, the mechanical engineering student, for example, is enrolled in math and engineering classes at WCTC. As his college schedule changes at the term - he's currently enrolled in Calculus 2 and

For the seventh consecutive year, the SDNB "significantly exceeds expectations", according to 2022-23 state-issued district report cards. More impressively, of the 378 districts statewide, the SDNB was one of just I5 to reach that level, and one of only nine K-I2 districts to do so.

Additionally, all six of the SDNB schools either "exceed" or "significantly exceed" expectations on the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction's school report cards.

The report cards are intended to offer accountability of how well schools and districts statewide are preparing students to graduate. They provide scores (out of IOO) in four priority areas: student achievement, growth, target group outcomes and graduation readiness. All four of the SDNB's priority area scores were the same or higher than at least 93.9 percent of all districts in the state.

Elmwood, Poplar Creek and Eisenhower "significantly exceed expectations", while Orchard Lane, Ronald Reagan and West "exceed expectations". Of the more than I,000 public elementary schools in the state, Poplar Creek, with its score of 90.4, was one of just 42 to achieve a 90 or better.

"Only a small number of Wisconsin school districts achieve at the highest levels, and even fewer are able to maintain that consistency year after year," Superintendent Joe Garza said. "It is definitely a challenge, but for the better part of this decade, our students, staff and families have been up to the task.

"While the state report cards are just one way to measure a district's success, it is an important tool that not only lets us celebrate where we are, but also helps us identify areas in which we can improve."

Technical Statics - so, too, must his high school schedule. He relies on his counselor to help make this happen.

"My counselor, Mrs. Tammi Fure, has been a huge part of planning this path for me, mainly getting my high school schedule arranged so differently than normal," Kristian said. "She helped me sign up for my college classes and figure out what I needed to do in order to attend the classes. She made it work."

Fure and her colleagues at West had to get particularly creative with Kristian's schedule, splitting class periods mid-semester to coincide with WCTC's term schedule changes. But the creativity will allow Kristian to finish his WCTC associate degree weeks before he graduates from West with his high school diploma.

"We have hundreds of students in our high schools every day and a majority of them are here straight through the day," Fure said. "But we have a lot of students that need scheduling accommodations. It's our job to make it work for them in a way that allows them to pursue their dreams while at the same time satisfying their graduation requirements."

It's a sentiment Manzoor appreciates.

"My counselor, the principals and teachers are always willing to try," he said. "If there is a scheduling challenge, rather than saying, 'Oh we can't do that', they are always thinking, "How can we make this work? How can we help him take these classes and still let him be a normal student?"



Enrollment is filling up fast for the SDNB's Early Learning Program for the 2024-25 school year.

The community-based early learning program is led by qualified staff who provide age-appropriate programming in reading, writing, math and science, as well as focus on social and emotional development in an effort to prepare students for kindergarten and beyond.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

- For tuition-based students; students identified through district screening as needing kindergarten readiness skills; and students eligible for special education services.
- Half-day sessions in mornings (3-year-olds) and afternoons (3-year-olds and 4-year-olds, separately).
- Maximum IO:I student/teacher ratio.
- Held at Ronald Reagan Elementary, 4225 S. Calhoun Road.

Any child who is 3 years old on or before Sept. I, 2024, can enroll in the 3-year-old program for the 2024-25 school year. Any child who is 4 years old on or before Sept. I, 2024, can enroll in the 4-year-old program. Priority is given to district residents, but non-residents may apply.
