BOARD OF EDUCATION

SCHOOL BOARD GOALS

Last summer, the School Board established a series of goals aligned with the district's overarching strategic goals. Through the work of administration, the Board achieved its 2023-24 objectives:

Goal 1 - Student Achievement - Constantly strive to increase student achievement through opportunities and accountability.

Action items:

- Support the superintendent in achieving his academic goals.
- Have administration create a dashboard on the district website to track student performance on a rolling 3-year basis.

Goal 2 - Staff - Increase job satisfaction and make the SDNB an attractive employer.

Action items:

- Obtain a comprehensive staff wage assessment to ensure compensation is comparable/ competitive to other high-performing districts.
- Assess turnover data to ensure continued low attrition rates, in particular staff voluntarily leaving to go to other districts.

Goal 3 - Fiscal - Act with fiscal responsibility and be good stewards of physical assets.

Action Items:

- Obtain from administration a report on how much money has been received in sponsorships, where money is now or how it has been used and what are the plans to use it in the future.
- Increase Fund 41 annual funding from \$1 million to \$1.2 million for the next preliminary budget.

Goal 4 - Community - Engage the community more.

Action Items:

- Determine what opportunities are remaining for sponsorships.
- Promote the dashboard created under Goal 1 to the community.

STATE REPORT CARD

The Department of Public Instruction annually releases district and school report cards as a measure of accountability. According to the 2022-23 report cards issued in November:

- the SDNB "significantly exceeds expectations" for the seventh consecutive year;
- of 378 districts statewide, the SDNB is one of just 15 to reach that level, and one of only nine K-12 districts to do so;
- all six SDNB schools "exceed" or "significantly exceed" expectations;
- of the more than 1,000 K-6 elementary schools in the state, Poplar Creek (90.4) was one of just 42 to achieve a 90 or better.

U.S. NEWS & WORLD REPORT

The SDNB's high schools were once again considered among the state's and nation's best, according to the U.S. News & World Report's 2024 rankings:

- Eisenhower ranked fifth in Wisconsin for the third straight year and fifth time in six years;
- West climbed two spots to 18th after ranking 20th two years in a row;
- a total of 462 Wisconsin high schools were ranked by the publication;
- among the top-five, Eisenhower is one of only three traditional public high schools;
 West ranked in the top 15 for traditional public high schools:
- both schools finished in the top 5 percent of the nearly 17,700 nationally ranked schools;
- Ronald Reagan (70th), Elmwood (91st) and Poplar Creek (150th) all made the publication's list of top elementary schools in the state.

Schools can earn this recognition based on criteria that reflect a commitment to increasing college-going culture, providing opportunities for students to earn college credit, and maximizing college readiness.

And **Andrew Gerlach**, who had been a literacy coach at West, was promoted to associate principal at Eisenhower to replace Mr. Gemignani.

PHY ED TEACHER EARNS AWARD...

Ronald Reagan physical education teacher **Katie Mulloy** was presented with the Presidential Outstanding Service Award during the Wisconsin Health and Physical Education Association's convention. She has served the association as treasurer and as the chair of the Health Moves Minds program.

... AND SO DO TECH ED TEACHERS

West tech ed teacher Bill Trudell earned a Manufacturing, Engineering and Technology Education Impact Award. The award, presented by Plexus Corp., recognizes educators who excel at inspiring students toward future career opportunities in STEM fields. Eisenhower tech ed teacher Dana McLaren received an award of recognition by FANUC America for her support and advocacy for automation education.





'HERO' PRINCIPAL

Orchard Lane principal **Royce Lindner** earned Modern Woodmen of America's Hometown Hero award. The award is given annually to individuals in southeastern Wisconsin who demonstrate good moral character, selflessness, humility, a caring nature, someone who is courageous and generous, and someone who pops into your head when you think of "hometown hero".

FOUR SDNB EDUCATORS EARN HERB KOHL HONORS

For the seventh consecutive year, at least four SDNB educators were chosen as Herb Kohl Educational Foundation Fellowship award winners: Jessica Albert, a fifth-grade teacher at Elmwood; Diane Hudaj, an English/speech teacher at West; Matthew Hunt, a counselor at West; and Dana McLaren, a technology education teacher at Eisenhower and West. They were among the 100 Wisconsin teachers to earn the award. Fellowship recipients are educators who have been chosen for their leadership and service in and outside the classroom, their ability to inspire a love of learning and to motivate their students.



ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE



HOME BUILDERS AT IT AGAIN

Construction III students spent the first semester participating in a partnership with Tim O'Brien Homes to build a home in New Berlin. The students dedicated nearly half their school day on the job site. This marked the sixth consecutive year the SDNB has partnered with the construction company to provide real-world experience and training to those interested in the trades.

Students in the SDNB's Beyond 18 Pathways program collaborated with construction students to create impressive game card holders they sold at a fundraising craft fair in the spring.



REPEAT SPELLING CHAMP

Elmwood sixth-grader **Ethan Robert** repeated as champion
of not only the school district
spelling bee over the winter,
but also of the regional bee to
advance to the Badger State
Spelling Bee.





WEST EARNS FIRST ACDEC CHAMPIONSHIP

At the state academic decathlon competition, West was crowned the overall state champion for the first time in school history, while Eisenhower was named the Division 3 state champ.

West's **Sebastian Correa** earned top scholar honors, breaking the school record for highest points earned. The team earned 30 individual medals, placing first statewide in economics, literature, math, music and interview. The Vikings also qualified for the national competition in Pittsburgh in the spring. Eisenhower's top scorer was **Isha Joshi**, who joined her teammates in amassing the highest team score in Division 3, and the sixth-best statewide regardless of division.



PERFECT ACT SCORE

Amelia Sikri made it back-to-back years for West to claim a student with a perfect ACT score of 36. Only about one quarter of 1 percent of students who take the ACT earn the highest composite score possible, putting Amelia in elite company.

'FUN' IN FUNDRAISING

- Poplar Creek's Creek Crawl, organized by the school's Parent Teacher Organization, ran out of hot dogs - despite ordering 600, more than ever before - and raised \$40,000.
- Ronald Reagan's Home and School Association organized the annual Fun Run and raised nearly \$50,000, a portion of which went to library upgrades.
- Elmwood's "Fun" Raiser raised close to \$50,000 for the school community, with the culminating activity, a Booth-or-Treat event, that included booths organized by families and a successful raffle.
- Orchard Lane's Kindness Fundraiser where students solicit donations and promise to repay them through acts of kindness - grossed nearly \$28,000 and helped the Parent Faculty Council claim the naming rights of the Star Commons.

KINDNESS WEEK

All four elementary schools celebrated Kindness
Week in November. One of the highlights was the kindness chain link; every time a student was seen doing something kind by a classmate or staff member, the school added a link to the chain. The schools also took part in a spirit week and kindness book read alouds, and collected nearly 3,900 items for a local food pantry.





ROLLIN' IN THE HARDWARE

Eisenhower's middle school engineering team dominated STEM Forward's Contrapt Contest at WCTC. Using their creativity and skills to design and build a chain reaction machine that rolls dice in 8-20 steps, Eisenhower groups finished first, second and fourth in the standings and earned the Best Construction and Peer awards.





DECA CHAPTERS IMPRESSIVE AT STATE

The Eisenhower and West chapters participated in DECA's State Career Development Conference, with 20 students qualifying for the international event in Anaheim, CA last spring. Participants engaged in a series of tests, projects, and roleplays, showcasing their skills and knowledge.

A total of 43 students competed with 29 earning medals. Eisenhower's international qualifiers were Tanja Ajder, Emily Daniel, Molly Flanagan, Aryan Joshi, Axel Krainz, Sara Mueller, Abby Oelschlager, Elaina Raicu, Ami Scott, Jalesh Hari Sesham, Keegan Tadych, Rebecca Tharaniyil and Megan Wisniewski. West's international qualifiers were Amelia Sikri, Mariah Flood, Sania Dhillon, Sydney Keelan, Graham McKenzie, Sebastian Correa and Dan Tiwari.

ATHLETIC EXCELLENCE







VIKINGS WIN STATE TRACK EVENT, SET RECORD

West's girls track and field team scored in four events at the Division 2 state meet in La Crosse, highlighted by a state-record run in the 800-meter relay. Ashley Babcock, Caroline Gerovac, Aubrey Lane and Natalie **Leupi** finished in 1 minute, 42.65 seconds, nearly 2 full seconds faster than the runners-up. The time bested a 14-year-old mark of 1:42.86 set by Milwaukee Lutheran in 2010. But that's not all. In the 400 relay, Babcock, Lane and Leupi teamed with Julia Garny for second place.

Other top efforts included Leupi in the 100 dash (seventh) and Lane in the 200 dash (eighth), as well as Eisenhower's Gabby Peterson in the pole vault (seventh, tie) and Faith Wehrman in the 3,200 (eighth).

HOOPS MILESTONES

Eisenhower boys basketball senior captain Ari Nimani became the fifth boys player in school history to eclipse 1,000 career points, and Eisenhower girls basketball coach Joel Claassen reached the incredible milestone of 700 career victories in early February.




WEST DANCE TEAM WINS STATE; IKE **DANCE RUNNERS-UP**

The West dance team earned its first state championship in six years and second overall when it claimed the Division 2 hip hop crown at the Wisconsin Association of Cheer/Pom Coaches state meet in La Crosse in February. The Vikings, who were state runners-up in the hip hop competition in both 2020 and 2021, previously won the state title in 2018.


One month later, the Vikings earned first place in the extra small school division


in both pom and hip hop in Orlando in March, bringing home two national championship trophies.



CONTINUED CROSS COUNTRY SUCCESS

Eisenhower junior Faith Wehrman, the 2022 WIAA Division 2 state cross country champion, followed her championship season with a sixth-place finish at the state meet in Wisconsin Rapids in late October. She led the Lions to a 14thplace overall team finish. Also at state, West freshman Emily Zeller finished in an impressive 25th-place in her state debut.







SOFTBALL ADVANCES TO STATE AGAIN

Led by Woodland Conference player of the year and first team all-state selection **Ryann Nutt**, the Eisenhower softball team (21-5) qualified for the eighth state tournament in school history - and second in a row - when it defeated Pius XI, 2-1, in the sectional final. In Madison, the Lions fell in the semifinal to eventual state champion Waupun by that same score.

SWIMMING / DIVING STARS

Eisenhower had nine entries in the D2 girls swim and dive championships at Waukesha South in November where they finished 13th overall. Senior **Meredith Giese** led with a fourth-place finish in the 50-yard freestyle - she was also ninth in the 100 free - and junior **Emily Wagner** took fifth in 1-meter diving.

IKE SOCCER FALLS JUST SHORT

The 2022 state champion lke boys soccer team fell one win shy of a return trip to state when the Lions' season ended with a narrow loss to Pius XI in the sectional final. Likewise, the Lions' girls team, vying for its fourth-straight state appearance and led by conference player of the year and first-team all-state selection **Sarah Stadler**, an LSU recruit, fell to Catholic Memorial in a sectional final shootout.

WRESTLER REPEATS

Amelia Poplawski and Natalia Poplawski, two of four New Berlin United competitors to advance to state, both made the podium at the WIAA Girls State Wrestling Tournament at the Kohl Center in Madison. Amelia, a sophomore, replicated her fifth-place effort from the previous season at 132 pounds; Natalia, a junior, finished sixth at 138.



BUDGET DETAILS / STRATEGIC FINANCE



FISCAL PRIORITIES

Balancing the School District of New Berlin's immediate fiscal needs and long-term financial health happens annually. With administration's and the School Board's joint focus on providing high-quality educational experiences for all students AND realizing the desires of all taxpayers, fiscal responsibility and strategic planning are the overarching themes of every budget cycle.

SMALL UPTICK FOR TAX LEVY, TAX RATE

After 10 consecutive years of decreased tax rates, including a 14.80 percent drop last year to \$5.87 per \$1,000 of equalized value, the SDNB is expecting a slight increase in the tax rate for 2024-25. The preliminary budget, approved by the School Board this summer, calls for a 1.36 percent increase of the tax rate to \$5.95. The result is an estimated increase of \$28 gross school tax levy on a home valued at \$250,000.

2024-25 PRELIMINARY BUDGET KEY POINTS

In June, the School Board approved the district's preliminary budget, which sets fiscal priorities for the school year and allows the administration to operate until the original budget is adopted in October.

Several factors can lead to changes between the summer's preliminary budget and the fall's original - or final - budget, including state aid distribution, equalized property values, legislation and more. Preliminary budget assumptions, however, include:


- Flat enrollment and state aid projections;
- = \$325 increase in per pupil revenue limit;
- elimination of ESSER reimbursement;
- Board approved 3.0% increase in base wages and associated benefit increases;
- various classroom staffing increases;
- increases in transportation and utilities

DEBT WITHIN THE OPERATING BUDGET

The SDNB has long had debt within the operating budget. Whereas most Wisconsin school districts typically ask their communities to support a referendum for new schools or facilities, the SDNB built Ronald Reagan Elementary and made significant upgrades to New Berlin West - including the field house and performing arts center - nearly two decades ago without a referendum. Instead, the SDNB absorbed the debt into its operating budget.

But those debt payments are nearing an end; the SDNB is on pace to pay off Ronald Reagan, West and ESCO - or energy savings projects - by 2030!



FUND 41 HIGHLIGHTS: WEST OUTDOOR ATHLETICS COMPLEX UPGRADE

West is finally getting plumbed outdoor bathrooms. Thanks to a gracious donation from a West family, funds from previous naming rights agreements, and a commitment by the School Board and administration to use Fund 41, the district's long-range capital improvement fund, the construction of a new concessions / outdoor bathroom building is expected to be completed by the first home varsity football game of the season.

Other Fund 41 projects completed or started last school year include generator upgrades or replacements at five schools, sidewalk replacements at West and Elmwood, a parking lot section replacement at Poplar Creek and new bleachers in Eisenhower's main gym.

Summer projects and those to be completed this school year include a new switchgear system at Eisenhower, a new generator at Poplar Creek and the replacement of the public address and safety communication systems at all schools.

Fund 41 was adopted by the School Board in 2022. The fund supports the capital maintenance of facilities. Dollars levied into the fund can only be used for capital facility improvements; it enhances, rather than replaces, the regular maintenance budget and allows for early bidding on projects which results in favorable costs and timely completion dates.

Since the fund was created, the district has completed more than \$4 million worth of projects.







OUTDOOR FACILITY TASK FORCE

Last spring the Board of Education commissioned an Outdoor Facilities Task Force to explore plans and possible funding mechanisms needed to improve the outdoor athletic complexes at Fisenhower and West


SDNB's high schools are the only two in Waukesha County and two of only six Woodland Conference schools that do not have any turf or synthetic playing surfaces. All of New Berlin's contiguous neighbors have turf football / soccer stadium surfaces; some have additional turfed fields (i.e. baseball, softball). Additionally, the schools' tracks need to be reconstructed, and other potential upgrades, such as the addition of lights and / or the reconfiguration of current field layouts, would result in more usage and availability.

The Task Force includes dozens of community members and several staff members, including coaches, teachers and school / district administrators. They have met three times so far with additional meetings scheduled for this fall before it shares its recommendations with the School Board.

NAMING RIGHTS UPDATE

NEW SAFETY PROTOCOL

Last school year, the SDNB, in conjunction with the New Berlin Police Department, began utilizing the Standard Response Protocol, or SRP, for all building emergencies and incidents. The SRP utilizes clear, common language and is based on an all-hazards approach as opposed to individual scenarios. The SRP was implemented at all six schools, improving the uniformity of the SDNB's safety preparedness. Students and staff trained, practiced and drilled the SRP throughout the year.

RECORD BREAKING IMPACT GRANTS

The Education Foundation of New Berlin awarded a record-breaking \$18,000 in Impact Grant Awards to fund six amazing projects in 2024. Since its inception in 2021, the EFNB has awarded more than \$51,000 in impact grants.

HVAC TRAINERS

Construction teachers Taylor Molitor and Ben Bauer are bridging the gap between theoretical HVAC learning and its practical applications. Their curriculum promises to bring HVAC training boards into their construction classrooms ensuring students are not only equipped with theoretical knowledge but also adept at real-world HVAC challenges.

INVENTABLES

Elmwood Elementary's Leah Schretenthaler, Megan Wierl and Lisa Payne are championing safety and innovation in the makerspace with their project, InvenTables. By introducing the safest tools for children to cut cardboard and encouraging the utilization of diverse materials, they are fostering a culture of creativity and safety.

ELEMENTARY COMPUTER SCIENCE EDUCATION

Caroline Haebig and Jennifer Schlie-Reed's project brings the CODEHS computer science curriculum to classrooms in all SDNB elementary schools. Computer science empowers young learners with essential digital literacy skills to thrive in college, career and life.

EDUCATION THROUGH UKULELES
